So many people in our congregation live and work day in and day out. You may see their work at church from time to time, but the rest of the week they are...you are, out and about – living your life and showing the love of God to so many in our community.

I am privileged to hear some of the stories that are told of the love and forgiveness people experience through you in their day-to-day life. I also see the very love that I speak of being shown, often in challenging and difficult situations.

Thank you for being Christ to others. Thank you for showing them love and forgiveness. Thank you for being God's people in all the places you live and travel.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I love the above poem by Howard Thurman because it reminds me the birth of Christ is just the beginning. It's not an end to anything. We are invited into God's mission of caring for God's people and the world God made.

Luke 10:27 reminds us that Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." That is the work put before us now. The work given to us by the one whose birth we just celebrated.

I look forward to the many ways that we will do this work together. May the work we do in Christ's name be blessed richly this year and in all the years to come!

Enlightenment strikes. That is the meaning behind the logo for the Grateful Dead, one of the most recognizable names in the history of popular music. With its bold, graphic, red white and blue color scheme, the logo depicts a human skull with a giant lightning bolt in its center, symbolizing a sudden rush and realization of truth and meaning in life.

While not all of us at St. John's Lutheran Church are deadheads, one thing I do know that applies to each of us is how the liturgical season of Epiphany is an embodiment of enlightenment striking each of us. To have an epiphany means to have an important revelation or insight that fundamentally changes your view of life.

Saint Matthew's gospel presents this epiphany, the reality of Christ's birth and presence among us, as something that is recognized by folks who should have no reason to do just that. The Magi are not Jewish, yet they recognize the importance of Jesus' birth long before Herod and all the religious leaders in Jerusalem did. Immediately after preaching the Sermon on the Mount, where Jesus said "I have not come to abolish the law but fulfill it", something just as crazy happens. The first person Jesus encounters is a Roman Centurion, whose faith in him is so great that he doesn't even ask Jesus to come to his home to heal his servant: "...Only speak the word, and my servant will be healed."

This is the reality of God's amazing and surprising grace, as Pastor Fred likes to say. It strikes like lightning where and when we least expect it, and it happens in and through folks whom we would never expect. Where, in this Epiphany season, is God calling each of us to witness amazing and surprising grace, striking seemingly out of nowhere?

### **Epiphany Star Words**

Epiphany is the second-oldest festival of the Christian church (only Easter is an older observance). Originally, Epiphany celebrated four different events, all on one day: the birth of Jesus, his Baptism, his first miracle, and the visit of the Wise Men. Each of these is a revelation of God to humanity.

The Festival of Epiphany is always on January 6th (thirteen days after Christmas) and the season of the church year that follows is about the unwrapping of the Father's gift to the world of his only-begotten Son ('epiphany' is a Greek word for 'to be visible'). Christmas was about Jesus as fully human—a baby son born to Mary and laid in a manger. But Epiphany is about a Jesus who is fully divine—the Son of God.

Would you like to join the practice of receiving a Star Word for 2023, as part of your discipleship journey?

One single word is used to help us practice our discipleship throughout the new year. Here's how it works:

It works best to let God help you choose a word at random – don't just read through the list and take a word that you feel is easy. (You might be surprised, I was!) Choose a number from 1 to 50 and use that as your Star Word for 2023. Think about your first reaction to the word you have, does it sound unlike you and your habits? Is it an "easy" word that you use many times in your thoughts and prayers? This could be a challenge to see the word on a deeper level, really apply it to your discipleship. You may share your journey with your Star Word if you choose, or you may keep it as a private study between you and God.

Example: I received the word "reliability" as my first Star Word a couple of years ago. I thought, great I can do this. I am reliable. I show up to work and meetings on time, I finish the tasks asked of me. Then I looked at it the other way around and saw how God is so very reliable to me. He is ALWAYS there. What a great way to see God's presence in my life!

Give yourself a challenge – try a Star Word. It is not necessary to think about it every day. It will pop into your thoughts when the Holy Spirit wants to get your attention.

This idea has been copied from The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church of Manchester, MO. The Youth Pastor started this with her confirmation students and it was so popular that all the congregation wanted to take part. Give it some thought, and try it out for yourself.

### Call to Order/Opening Remarks:

Meeting was called to order at 6:05 p.m. by Nancy Kaufman. Nancy K started to ask for approval of the agenda but realized we were sent last month's agenda so were not able to approve. A devotion/prayer was then given by Nancy.

### **Secretary Minutes:**

The November minutes were submitted online by Cathy Yanke. A motion to approve minutes was made by Lon and seconded by Megan. Motion carried.

### Treasurer report:

The committee reviewed and discussed the October and November 2022 Treasurer Report submitted by Donna Nelson.

In October, \$20,000 was transferred from savings to checking to make the final furnace payment of \$16,000 for the insulation not in the original price because they were unable to re-use the original insulation. October expenses exceeded income by almost \$30,000.

November update included completing a signature sheet for identification for expense reports. A discretionary fund was established for the pastor's use for unbudgeted special benevolence for needs that are brought to the attention of the pastors outside of the budget.

YTD our expenses have exceeded income by \$50,000.

• The Nominating Committee has been unable to find a nominee to fill the Parish Education Chair position, but we are still working on this.

• Lon is checking into the EXIT sign issue, that was discovered during the last power outage.

• We are working on shifting some budget dollars to create 2 small discretionary funds for last minute issues that may arise during the year that couldn't be foretold.

### **Pastor/Intern Reports**

### Fred's Report:

• Our bell ringing for the Salvation Army went well. Thanks to Linda Michaels and Patti Barritt for their work in collecting the funds. A total of \$3,663.39 was collected. Thanks to the Bank of Prairie Du Sac for issuing a counter check to the Salvation Army for these funds.

• Intern John and I discussed the 3-month evaluation last week. There are two more evaluations in the process for internship. John and I completed the first one. John, the Internship Committee and I will complete the 6 and 12-month evaluations. I have also completed the 2023-24 Internship Application. Assignments are made mid-March.

· It has come to my attention that Sauk Prairie is in great need of childcare locations for children up to age three. Because of this need, the Sauk Prairie School District has been working with the Chamber of Commerce to explore possible options to meet this need. One option has been to look at local churches as possible sites for childcare centers. We were approached as to whether we might be open to hosting such a center. We hosted Head Start here for at least 15 years. Because of our history I told the school district that we would be open to a conversation. Two weeks ago, a state childcare facility inspector, along with the Chamber Executive and a childcare specialist, came to look over our facility. On a first look it appears that we meet most of the state childcare building codes. What appeared to be an issue was that two rooms that would be used would need exterior doors added. If we decided to go ahead with being a site, all costs would be covered by the school district through grants, school district funds and community donations. Superintendent Jeff Wright met with Sally and me last week to look at our facility and talk more about what the next steps might be from the school district's perspective. He felt our site could work if the church was open to sharing the space during the week.

• During Covid a fund was established to help members and others with various needs. This fund was completely set up by donations from members. The fund has been depleted but the need to help has not. Recently I became aware of a need that we could not fund. I made several phone calls and due to the generosity of various members, nearly \$13,000 was collected and more was pledged. Until the Covid fund was established, it had been many years since we had a regular fund to help those in need. I am proposing that we establish a fund and put it into our yearly budget. The purpose would be the same, that of helping members and others in need. The fund could be under Stewardship and be one of benevolence funds. I would like the PPC to discuss how this might take shape.

### Sally's Report:

Below is my report for PPC, including Parish Education Board updates.

 Confirmation students peeled potatoes for the community Thanksgiving meal and we are looking forward to some caroling at Maplewood Nursing Home in December if they are still allowing visitors.

• We had a very nice Thanksgiving service with 6 participating clergy members.

• I am directing the Sunday School Christmas Program. It will be on Sunday, December 18th at 1pm. Many thanks to the Parish Ed Board, teaching staff, and musicians who are working hard to make this happen.

• Adult Ed continues with Intern John's series on Bible and Film. He will teach into mid-January. Then I will offer a series on Cliches of Faith.

• We are still looking for someone to chair the Parish Education Board. Please spread the word.

• We will celebrate the Anniversary of Baptism Milestone on Sunday, January 8th. As of this writing, we baptized 15 children this year.

• The staff is busy coordinating all of the details for the Christmas services. I am grateful for their hard work!

### Intern John's Report:

• Fred and I, along with the internship committee, recently completed and submitted the 3-month internship evaluation to Wartburg Seminary. There will be a 6 month and then a full year evaluation.

• Teaching confirmation for 7th grade continues on also, as well as other expected assignments for an Intern such as visitation, leading

worship, preaching, one-on-one meetings with Pastor Fred, and regular communication with Wartburg.

• I began teaching an Adult Education series on Film and Theology during the Sunday School hour. Each week, a different film is discussed in conjunction with a passage of scripture, which provides for one-on-one engagement as well as vigorous group discussion. This will continue through January 15th.

• In early November, I attended the Lutheran Outdoor Ministry's Leadership Training Event in Boise, Idaho. This was a continuing education opportunity which I gained much out of, including connections with camps local to Wisconsin and the ELCA.

• At my last internship meeting, Cliff Thompson described in detail a unique ministry opportunity and partnership with Tower Rock Elementary School, whereby I would be a regular volunteer starting in late January/early February and continue for the rest of school year.
