Dear Friends of St. John's,

My Dad was fond of little sayings that he carried around and would at the appropriate or inappropriate moments, share them at will. I noticed during one of our cherished fishing trips that he was moving a little slower and had a tough time trying to walk and balance on the rocky shoreline we were fishing from. His struggles would only get worse every year as his knee joints and hips would become more painful. I always encouraged him to get those joints looked at and possibly replaced but my Dad, being a stubborn soul, just learned to live with it. It was around this time that he started offering one of my favorite sayings he uttered with such disdain: "This getting old thing stinks!" Now he would also add in for good measure, some advice for me saying "Jay, don't ever get old."

Well, I can honestly say that no matter how much I want to slow the aging process and attempt to stay 25, it's impossible. We know that. We are 18 one day, and the next day we are 50, or 65, or 99. We see in the mirror, an older version of ourselves that we thought at one time would take forever to become. Time has a nasty tendency to follow us regardless of our trying to outrun it, avoid it, or deny it. I have met people who gladly acquiesce to their own aging, and they age as people point out, "so gracefully." Yet I tend to be that man who is aging not so much gracefully as I am begrudgingly. My eyesight keeps getting worse, my joints play a Neil Peart drum fill every time I rise out of bed in the morning, my beard is peppered with gray hair, and I can't seem to get enough naps in. One of my biggest struggles has been with my weight. Weight has been a lifelong battle, and it has produced some issues.

Last month, I was hospitalized with a fairly good-sized cellulitis that needed immediate attention. Now this was not my first "rodeo." I have had seven of these before. I cannot stress this enough: there is no pain equal to these nasty infections. And I have become familiar with how they behave. Cellulitis is angry, relentless, and intrusive. But they are my own fault. Not taking care of my blood sugars and not reducing my A1C is in direct to these infections making their appearances. And usually, the plan of care involves a surgical procedure, antibiotics, and pain medications. This particular hospital stay at "Chez-UW" was full of ups and downs: infiltrations due to the caustic nature of the antibiotic and the infection itself was taking its sweet time getting better. Admittedly, the saving grace in all this was the incredible compassionate care of the nurses. They were the ones who shared a connective humanity in their attention, time, and conversations. These lovely men and women showed me such an empathic warmth in their care. And I was/am grateful for their professionalism and their hearts.

I might not like the challenges, the questions, and the unforeseen issues related to my health and the juggernaut known as aging. But what choice do I have? Sorry Dad, I can't NOT get old. Aging and the issues that come along with it are part of the limits we have in our mortality. Our mortal coil is not meant to last forever. We are here for a limited time. I once read that when we look at a gravestone and we see the dash between the date of birth and the date of death, that dash is the life we lived. That dash is between the limitation of our beginning and our end. That dash is our life. Was my Dad right? Does aging stink? Depends on how we embrace it. Aging is part of the natural order of how God made us, ensuring that we don't live forever, at least here on earth. Aging doesn't mean that we will not face difficulties, or challenges, or issues of health. We will face these, but we don't age alone. We age together. We age gaining wisdom of life. We age gaining a greater sense of self. We age in the dash between our birth and our death. But the life we live is up to us. Age doesn't mean we stop living. It means we get better at it. What joy is in our faith to see the dash as a gift that continues to reveal who we have been. who we are, and who we will be once our lives have finished. My friends, I wish us all good health, vibrant faith, and a joyful embrace of life.

The youth travelers and adult leaders talked about the trip and their experiences during the July 21<sup>st</sup> sermon. They shared, "The purpose of this trip was to meet like-minded youth, and to expand our relationships with God. We were challenged before we left to find Jesus each day...Jesus was extremely present in the energy of the nightly gatherings where all 16,000 of us gathered for the same purpose. But that energy extended beyond; out into the streets for the miles and miles we walked, and into the nightlife and dances that the Gathering sponsored for the youth late into each night.

I liked learning about "the work". I was reminded that struggling schools aren't the work, the education system is. Homeless people aren't the work, housing issues are the work. African Americans aren't the work, racism is the work. And so on, and so on. I found Jesus in the many uplifting stories and messages we took part in. We heard about being our true selves, accepting others as they are, and learned about being loud and disruptive to make change in the church, the community, and the world."

Dear Friends in Christ,

We have been gathering as a whole community for 9am worship for almost two full months now. That's so hard to believe. Thank you for being flexible and willing to engage in this holy experiment this summer!

This is an opportunity for another experiment – getting to know each other. I know just the suggestion of interacting with people can cause palms to sweat and hearts to race. That is not a judgment or put down. That is just a fact that we're all wired differently.

But I'd like to encourage us to take some risks when we're feeling bolder for the sake of growing in relationship as a faith community.

I'd like to offer a few suggestions for how we might get to know each other. A special thanks to Jackie Frosch for doing some research for me.

- 1. Go beyond saying Hello. Welcome back, good to see you, glad you are here, etc. (If you don't know if they're a longtime member, lean toward comments like "good to see you.")
- 2. Seek out people that are looking for something and offer to help them find it, whether it's the restroom or a person they need to speak with.
  - 3. Smile (obvious one, but still needs to be said).
- 4. Include children say hello, notice their toy, compliment them in some way, etc. It might make it easier to connect with the parent(s).
- 5 It's OK to ask for names..."I'm sorry, I don't recall your name! I'm so-n-so..."
- 6. If not comfortable with #5., ask someone else if they know a name, then approach the person. (Sometimes the pastors do this!)
- 7. Volunteer for projects. Great way to meet people you may never have a chance to meet.
- 8. Be a greeter or an usher. Another great way to meet people, or to simply reconnect with old acquaintances.

We all have different areas of comfort and that is OKAY! Find what works best for you and allows you to build relationships with those around you.

Hebrews 13:2 states, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it."

You never know what impact you might have on someone's day or even their faith when you simply say hello and get to know one another.

We are asking for your help in gathering supplies for our School Kits again this year. The kits are sent to Lutheran World Relief each fall. LWR asks that we do not use items with a U.S. flag, military symbols, camouflage or religious symbols on them. Each kit needs:

Four 70-sheet notebooks

**One** 30 cm. ruler (or one with inches and cms.)

One pencil sharpener

One blunt scissors

Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers

Five black or blue ballpoint pens

One box of 24 crayons

One 2 ½ inch eraser



### Personal care kit supplies

One light-weight bath towel (not longer than 48" please)
Two bath-size bars of wrapped soap (any brand)
One adult-size toothbrush in its original wrapping
or sealed in a business size envelope
One sturdy comb
One metal nail clipper

<sup>\*\*</sup>pencil sharpeners and notebooks are especially needed

<sup>\*\*\*</sup>bath towels and soap are especially needed



### Baby care kit supplies

Two cotton/cotton-blend t-shirts
Two gowns or sleepers without feet
Two receiving blankets
Four cloth diapers
One hand towel
One sweater, sweatshirt, or
jacket with a hood, (or include a baby cap)
Two pairs of baby socks
Two bath-size bars of Ivory soap
Two diaper pins or large safety pins

Sizes up to 24 months may be used. Consider varying the sizes of the clothing items so the layette will continue to be useful as the baby grows. Gently used, clean items may be substituted for new ones.

### Interim Jason's Report:

- · June was a busy month as I experienced officiating three very different funerals. I co-officiated the funeral for Rev. Eldor Fruehling along with Pastor Sally on June 7<sup>th</sup>. I was then honored to officiate the funeral for Sterling Walsh on June 24<sup>th</sup>. That same week I officiated a funeral for a non-church member at Hooverson's on June 8<sup>th</sup> for Marilyn Gilding. A HUGE thank you to all our staff and volunteers who helped with arrangements, luncheons, facilities, and music. These were large funerals, and many hands were involved with making sure families and friends were welcomed, with the most generous of hospitality shared graciously. Thank you to all who made it all happen.
- · I also led a memorial service for Rev. Fruehling at Maplewood Village on June 12 for the residents who live there. Eldor was a resident at Maplewood Village for a few years and was very well loved and respected. Around 25 residents attended, where I led a small prayer time, and opened up the time for residents to share stories and memories of Eldor. Many people recalled how Eldor was such a kind and gentle soul who always took the time to listen and care.
- New Member Sunday was held on June 30th in conjunction with the "Brats for Jesus" (National Youth Gathering Fundraiser) event after worship. 21 mailings and emails were sent out to perspective members who have attended worship at SJLC.
