Dear Friends of St. John's,

Recently, Megan and I took a vacation to Orlando, where we visited the "Church of the Mouse." Disney World is definitely a magical place. We did the normal tourist things and enjoyed the various parks, went on a few rides, bought some stuff (no I did not buy myself Mickey Mouse ears), and enjoyed the time together. This was a different kind of vacation for me. Not because of the destination or the company I was with, but it was "how" I got around the various locations. Due to my unfortunate accident in August, I knew that walking around the park would be next to impossible. The solution was to rent a mobile scooter.

Now I was not all that crazy about traversing the parks on wheels for the simple fear of judgment. Yet what choice did I have? So, as you can imagine, the upside to using a scooter was that it made my experience mostly pain-free and I was able to enjoy the time. It wasn't until I saw a Dad about my age with his own family, get onto the bus with his own scooter that I felt some sense of affirmation or validation. His condition was a lot worse than mine as he was wearing a boot cast on his left leg, and he had young kids. I felt compassion for this man and his family. He was there to enjoy a vacation just as I was. I saw him in his condition, and I felt connected to him.

I was naïve to think that just because school had started that this would somehow lessen the people in the parks. I was absolutely wrong. I instantly noticed that masses of people had descended onto Disney at the same time we had. This creates issues here and there as you can imagine. Long lines for rides, food, shopping, etc. But I noticed another issue, and this was brought on by my own mode of transportation. Sitting on a scooter isn't the same as standing as an almost 6-foot-tall man. I was a good two feet lower at best. As a consequence, many people did not "see" me. Now this isn't to say that I wasn't seen at all or that I expected people to get out of the way automatically. But I noticed right away that people did not see me for a variety of reasons. Most of which, people just weren't paying attention, and I did have an acute sense of situational awareness.

After a few days of this, something changed within me. I had a greater awareness of those who were traveling around the park on scooters just like me. I noticed them and would let them get ahead of me or take a corner first, or just offer the subtle head nod as a greeting. And other scooter riders noticed me, and they would do the same. It was like we were all this silent unseen group of riders who were bonded by our condition. This tension between being seen and acknowledged versus being unseen and not acknowledged, almost made our sense of awareness for each other necessary. All of this got me thinking about how we see each other and acknowledge each other.

Do we truly see each other? Do we truly acknowledge each other? Do we find a sense of connection with each other in our own "conditions?" Maybe that condition for you is finding a connection in your grief, your hurt, your isolation. Maybe that condition is marked by loneliness, age, memory loss. Maybe that condition is being a parent and struggling with your kids trying to navigate their own changes. Maybe that condition is struggling with your faith, not feeling good enough or worthy of God's love and acceptance. Maybe it's a condition where we just can't accept grace for ourselves. Do we see each other in our conditions, where we feel unseen, where we feel unnoticed every day? Do we see each other in the pews where we come and bring our hearts to worship hoping to feel better about ourselves in our conditions?

We don't need to be on a scooter to feel unseen. We can be living our lives every day and still feel it. What we can do is see each other, acknowledge each other in our humanity, our struggles, our issues, and accompany each other. We can't fix each other, but we can make all the difference by being present. That alone can be all the difference in being seen and heard.

Dear Friends in Christ,

I love Fall. The cooler temperatures that call for sweatshirts and jeans, the gorgeous pallet of changing leaves, and pumpkins. Yes, all things pumpkin. My drinks, my desserts, and my decorations.

Congregational Meeting

MEETING

On November 17, at 9am, we will have a congregational meeting between services in the sanctuary and on Zoom to approve our 2025 budget, elect members to our Parish Planning Council, elect three voting members to attend the Synod Assembly in 2025 and elect three congregational members to serve on our 2025 Nomination Committee. We will be voting to fill the open positions on our PPC. Our nominees are Executive Director-Nancy Passehl, Assistant Executive Director-Marv Hupp, Treasurer-John Brennan IV, PR and Social Concerns-Melani Wheeler, Stewardship-Kathy Lovell, Properties-John Ballweg and WELCA-Eunice Yanke. Our nominees for Synod Assembly Voting Members and nominees for the Nomination Committee will be taken from the floor on the day of the meeting.

All active members of St. John's are invited to attend. (The ELCA defines "active members" as those who have both given <u>and</u> communed at least one time in the previous year.)

Reading of the Congregational Meeting Minutes

In lieu of the reading of the minutes from the March 10, 2024 Congregational Meeting, the minutes are listed here. Please take the time to read through them before attending the meeting on November 17, 2024. You will have an opportunity to ask questions and/or make corrections at that meeting.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING March 10, 2024

(In building and via Zoom platform)

PPC Executive Director, Nancy Kaufman, confirmed at least 50 active members present and called the meeting to order at 8:55am. The purpose of the meeting is to approve the estimate to fix the organ.

The minutes of the October 15, 2023, Congregational Meeting were published in the March Visitor as well as in the March 3 and March 10, 2024, Sunday bulletins in lieu of reading them at the meeting. Motion to approve the minutes as provided was made by Brian Weeks and seconded by Connie Burton. Motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Nancy described the purpose of the meeting to be for approval of \$25,000 to have the organ fixed as proposed by Bogue Services. Additional information included some history of the organ including that the organ was purchased when the church was built in the 1960s. The current value of the organ is \$450,000. It is not currently working to its capacity. The fix as proposed is to return the organ to a functional level. If we were to return it to its concert level, the cost would be \$250,000.

Discussion included the following questions from the congregation:

- Will there be continuing costs in addition to the \$25,000? No, this cost will bring it back to a functional level.
- Who plays the organ other than Connie? At this time, no one, but Ruellene and Kim are both able to play an organ but considering the current condition the organ is in, they choose not to do so.
- When would the repairs be made? At this time the schedule would be late summer/fall with the project expected to last for 4-6 weeks.
- Will there be a warranty on the work? We expect that yes, there will be because the work will be done by the same company that tunes the organ.
- Are we able to use Memorial money for this project? Yes, we could if we wanted. Our purpose for this meeting is not to ask for money, but rather to request approval to use current funds for this project.
- Is this a good financial decision to spend this money with limited people who play organ? We believe yes, it is, for the future of our church. When we recruited for organists when Connie retired, some were unwilling to play our organ because it was in need of repair.

A motion to approve the \$25,000 to return the organ to its functional level was made by Mary Weeks and seconded by Janelle Hupp. Motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Nancy K shared other housekeeping items including the need for Palm Sunday Breakfast volunteers, a request for input to the Transition Committee's questions, and a request for volunteers to sign up to serve coffee between services.

Marv Hupp made the motion to adjourn the meeting and was seconded by Donna Nelson. Executive Director Nancy

Kaufman asked if there were any objections and after receiving none, she adjourned the meeting at 9:09am.
