

Dear Friends of St. John's,

Death. Resurrection. Salvation. These are the core of our Easter season, but what do they even mean?! If you are reading this, you haven't experienced death. We haven't been resurrected. Of any of these, perhaps some of us have tasted salvation through the wonders of mystery and grace. So, why is the Easter season based upon such difficult ideas?

The short answer is that life as a human is difficult, and it takes the majesty of God and salvation of Christ to overcome that! We need the extraordinary, the supernatural to overcome our humanness.

But wait! WAIT! Easter isn't about us being hopeless little humans. It's about the amazing assurance that no matter how hard things are, the fits and starts, the failures, that God is bigger than all of it; that Christ's death on the cross and resurrection on the third day, means that God will make use of us for glory. Easter is about the eternal hope, that God can use something even as profound as death to bring about life-saving grace and mercy.

Think of a daffodil. Last summer the daffodil had to die back, with long, stringy yellow leaves before disappearing completely, to rest and rejuvenate for this spring. It's during this time of dormancy (or apparent death) that it seems like nothing is going to come of last year's beautiful flowers. Then, through the fits and starts of springtime freezes and thaws, hope comes through little heads of green poking through the soil (resurrection). Eventually, with patience, rain and warmth, this year's unique flower is revealed (salvation).

Easter is our reminder of God's renewing process. Last year's flowers are gone, and we rest on faith that the green shoots of this year will bring about God's creative glory in bunches of flowers. Easter is a reminder that God brings new life, even through our toughest circumstances, through the death and resurrection of Christ on the cross. Praise be to God!

### Holy Week and Easter Worship Services

We will have Lenten worship services on Wednesdays, April 2 and April 9 at 1:00pm and 6:30pm. A light lunch is offered at noon on those Wednesdays. There will be no evening meals.

Worship services for Maundy Thursday will be at 1:00pm and 6:30pm on April 17. A light lunch is offered to all at noon. No evening meal is planned. Maundy Thursday's services center around the Last Supper and our practice of Holy Communion, "in remembrance of me" and includes the stripping of the altar.

On Easter Sunday, April 20, we will have a Sunrise Service at 7:00am, and celebration services at 8:00am and 10:30am. There will not be any Sunday School or Adult Education classes that day.




### **Baptism**

It's hard to believe that Ash Wednesday has already been in our rearview mirror for about a month and now we're marching toward Palm Sunday and Easter. Ashes covered our foreheads as we began our Lenten journey. We were reminded that we are dust and that to dust we shall return.

Ash Wednesday isn't a particularly lighthearted service to say the least. We tucked away our A!!e!(@s (see me if you're not sure what that word is ) for the season as we repent and return to God. And that mark is permanent.

The reality of our humanness, our sin, and our mortality is permanent. That mark remains.

But so does another mark. The mark made on our forehead in baptism, in anointing, in a communion blessing is also permanent. The marks on Jesus' hands, feet, and side are permanent proclaiming to us that the promises of his life, death, and resurrection remain. His promises are permanent.

But I'm getting a little ahead of myself because it's not Easter yet. We remain in Lent a little longer; we still must journey to the cross in Holy Week.

I invite you to join us on Palm Sunday (I hear we're having another yummy brunch!), Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. These are important days in our church year.

Our culture wants us to skip ahead to Easter, but we cannot have Easter without the crucifixion. Let's gather together the week of April 13 in worship. We will join the crowd in waving our palm branches. Then we'll gather with the disciples at the Last Supper and later sit at the foot of the cross as Jesus is crucified. Only after that can we come together to celebrate the empty tomb. Only after that can we fully understand (well, as much as we can ever understand) the magnitude of Christ's resurrection.

You have been marked. Christ's promises are for you, and they are permanent. May these promises sustain you on this journey.

### Call committee update.

We are optimistic with the recent developments in our call process for a senior pastor. Although this is a critically important process for our church, we want to thank our congregation for all your thoughts, inputs, patience, and prayers during this time. There are many churches currently searching for new pastors, even though there are not enough applicants to fill all these openings. Also, with the Lenten season upon us, many pastoral candidates may be busy in their current missions.

We have been working with the synod for several months to best present our church and community to those interested in becoming our next pastor. We currently have received a Rostered Minister Profile of a candidate from the synod and are making plans to interview this candidate in March. Confidentiality is essential during this process so we cannot share details at this time, but we will keep the congregation informed of our progress on a regular basis.

In the book of Acts, chapter 11, where the followers of Christ Jesus were first called Christians in Antioch, God sees when a church is without a pastor, can bless it in a pastor's absence, can bless it by providing a pastor, and will continue to bless it when a pastor arrives. Be encouraged that the Lord can grow a church without a pastor. (Acts 11:20-21). No pastor will be perfect, just as no congregation is perfect, but pray that our new pastor will "preach the word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke, and encourage—with great patience and careful instruction." (2 Timothy 4:2).

### Find Strength and Hope in the Cross

It is difficult as we kneel before the cross to hear the voice of the gospel. We might imagine that it waits for us at Eastertide, that tonight the law says its peace and come Sunday the gospel will finally win the day, but that is not so. The gospel spells freedom for those held captive to sin. The resurrection only matters for those who know they are dead.

We, who are both saints and sinners, kneel before the cross today or tonight and hear it speaking to us as both verdict and promise. It is true: each of us is guilty of our participation in the world's suffering. We, each bearing the image and likeness of God in our very skin, do not respect that image in one another, much less the world we inhabit, God's good garden.

We do not respect God's creations—one another, or the world we live in. We put one another on the crosses at which Jesus now joins us. We must admit this or there is no need for the salvation Christ brings. We must admit we are in bondage to these patterns of human violence and environmental degradation before we can be liberated from them.

This is the promise of Good Friday: we will be liberated from these crosses—the ones we hang on and the ones on which we hang one another. These crosses, at once symbols of the divisions between us and a symbol of the end to all divisions, promise that God will not abandon us in our suffering. God comes to us just like this, just as we are, but God does not leave us this way. This is the cross—evidence of our sin, and sign of God's love.
