Galatians 5:22-26 - The Fruit of the Spirit

"By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, competing against one another, envying one another."

I traveled to Guyana, South America, in January of 2019. The Guyanese people called their country a 3rd-world country because they are very poor. I was told that the suicide rate was one of the highest in the world. More Guyanese are living in North America than in Guyana. About 75% of the population is Afro-Guyanese or Indo-Guyanese. Guyana was first a Dutch colony in the late 16th century, and then became an English colony in the early 19th century. Plantations were established, and slaves were brought in for labor. When slavery was abolished by England in 1833, indentured servants were brought from British and Portuguese colonies in India. During the Cold War, the U.S. meddled in Guyanese politics for fear of a communist takeover. As an independent country since the late 1960s, Guyana has struggled. Oil was recently discovered off the coast, and drilling has begun. China and Russia are now interested in Guyana and are trying to influence events in Guyana. Venezuela is a neighbor to Guyana, and they have laid claim to the oil fields Guyana is drilling in the Atlantic. This is the historical baggage for many Guyanese people.

It didn't seem like there was much hope for the people of Guyana until you actually talked to people in their homes, on the streets, or at church. Typical greetings I experienced from a variety of people sounded like this: "A blessed good morning, dear brother!" Another greeting was repeated in this fashion: "Good evening, dear brother, I hope the blessings of your day follow you into the night!" It was easy to feel hopeful when greeted in that fashion. These greetings went beyond hope; they spoke to the faithfulness of the Guyanese people.

I attended a Men's Bible study at Transfiguration Lutheran Church, which was held monthly in a small village, except none of the men who regularly came to the study belonged to Transfiguration Lutheran Church. Men from three other Lutheran Churches met monthly at Transfiguration, hoping to draw attention from men in the neighborhood. Most of the Lutheran Churches were neighborhood churches in New Amsterdam, Guyana. The strategy worked that January. A man from the neighborhood joined us for a game of Dominoes after the study. Driving away afterwards, the men were very excited; they saw hope, and they had faith.

On another day, as Pastor Shirley and I were walking through a neighborhood, we were invited by a Hindu couple to stop in and visit. This Hindu couple lived next to Bethel Lutheran Church, which was one of Pastor Shirley's four churches she served. Pastor Shirley knew them well. The couple brought us gifts of water and bread. We went to the Hindu temple in their yard. The wife explained that they believed that the Christian God was the same as theirs. I admit I don't know much about the Hindu religion. The husband explained that he loved living next door to the Lutheran Church. He held the spare key for the church and helped out if they needed assistance. He told me that he and his wife had left the country for a while but came back. The couple wanted to give back to their neighborhood and their country. They had hope, and they had faith.

On another day, I met a man named John. John owned some land, and he rented it to local rice farmers. He and his family would come to the U.S. for 7 months a year. Through a connection, he had a job driving a delivery truck in the U.S. The family came back home for 5 months over the winter in the U.S., and repeated the pattern again the next year. I met John at his 50th birthday party. Except this was a different kind of party. There must have been 75 people in attendance when my co-religious attendee, Deacon Ackloo, and I arrived. Soon after we arrived, we led choruses of Christian songs. The last one went on for some time as we sang, "This is the day that the Lord has made, I will rejoice, and be glad in it!" We then read scriptures, and there was a short sermon, about a ½ hour. More music, and then food. While we were eating, John told me that he would never leave Guyana permanently. He had hope and faith in the future. His faith was centered on God's mercy.

I am thankful for all I learned from the good people of Guyana. God is faithful to each of us every minute of every day. Our faithfulness is a gift from God, even when it sometimes falters. It gives us faith and hope in our futures, even when there seems to be no hope. May God's faithful love and mercy be alive in you this day and every day! Have hope in tomorrow. Amen.

Of course, we can't forget the faithful people who did all the purchasing, assembling and getting everything ready to go. Quilters have been working hard all year! The numbers are as follows: 414 Quilts (438 total made), 32 Sewing kits, 77 Baby kits, 116 Personal Care kits, and 200 School kits. We are all very grateful to Thrivent who donated \$250 for each group of kits and also for the guilts. This was a tremendous lift for all of us.

Five ladies (Kathy Lester, Darlene Holl, Gloria Moles, Marian DeGiovanni and Ruth Dresser) have registered for the Synodical Biennial convention on Saturday, October 4th, at New Heights Church at the Grove: Regional Community Center in Mazomanie. WE STAND WITH YOU IN LOVE is the theme of the day. If anyone else decides to go, they still can but will have to pay \$50 for registration instead of the \$30 fee that "early-bird" people paid before August 17th.

October is Mental Illness Awareness Month

October 7th is a National Day of Prayer for Mental Illness. We encourage you to read this Prayer of Confession (from NAMI) on the 7th:

We confess that we are still uninformed about mental illness and how it impacts persons and their families. At times, because of our lack of knowledge and understanding we find ourselves separated from our neighbors with mental illness. their families and ourselves. There are lines drawn between us because we may define wholeness and normality with different words, but not a different spirit. Because of our lack of knowledge we live cut off from sources of strength and power that would help us be present to people with mental illness. This lack often makes us feel that we cannot act. So many events, meetings and needs call to us, grabbing our attention. that we find ourselves stretched to a fine, thin line. In the face of all this, we continue to seek knowledge and understanding of mental illness that will bring liberation and shalom to us and those we serve and unite us to action. O God, our liberation and shalom, we seek the power of your Spirit, that we may live in fuller union with you, ourselves and our neighbors with mental illness. Also grant that we may gain courage to love and understand each other. Amen.

October 10th is World Mental Health Day, which aims to raise awareness about mental health issues globally and mobilize efforts to support mental health initiatives. The day serves as a platform to break the stigma surrounding mental health and promote understanding and support for those affected by mental illness. Throughout the month of October, look for informational posters about mental illness/health topics on the kiosk in the Narthex. MEETING

Congregational Meeting

On November 9, after the first service, we will have a congregational meeting to approve our 2026 budget, elect members to our Parish Planning Council (PPC), elect three voting members to attend the Synod Assembly in 2026 and to elect three congregational members to serve on our Nomination Committee for 2026.

We will be voting to fill the open positions on our PPC. Our nominees are: Stewardship Board – Anne Klinkner, Member-at-Large – Mary Weeks, Secretary – Audrey Luetscher, Lay Ministry Board - **Open**, and Youth Board – **Open**. Current PPC members who are eligible and interested in a second two-year term include: Evangelism Board – Gwen Ringelstetter, Fellowship Board – Cathy McAlexander, Parish Education – James Newman, and Youth Member-at-Large – Sean Jager.

We will also vote on congregational members to attend our Synod Assembly next spring/summer. We need three adults and can have one youth member. Our nominees for Synod Assembly Voting Members and nominees for the Nomination Committee will be taken from the floor on the day of the meeting.

If you are interested in filling any of our open positions or would like to attend the Synod Assembly as a voting member representing St. John's, please see one of the pastors, Nancy Passehl or Nancy Kaufman. All active members of St. John's are invited to attend this important meeting (the ELCA defines "active members" as those who have both given and communed at least one time in the previous year.)

Reading of the Congregational Meeting Minutes

In lieu of the reading of the minutes from the November 17, 2024 Congregational Meeting, the minutes are listed here. Please take the time to read through them before attending the meeting on November 9, 2025. You will have an opportunity to ask questions and/or make corrections at that meeting.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING November 17, 2024

(In building and via Zoom platform)

PPC Executive Director, Nancy Kaufman, confirmed at least 50 members were present and called the meeting to order 8:58 am. The purpose of the meeting is to approve the 2025 budget, vote on

nominees for the Parish Planning Council, approve nominating committee members for PPC recruiting, and approve Synod Assembly volunteers.

The minutes of the October 2023, Congregational meeting were published in the November Visitor as well as in the November 3 and 10, 2024 Sunday bulletins in lieu of reading them at the meeting. Motion to approve the minutes as provided was made by Donna Nelson and 2nd by Brian Weeks. Motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Nancy described the 2025 budget changes that were printed and available for review in the bulletin. She pointed out those most significant changes including the administration budget that include salary expectations for a new senior pastor. The salary budgeted follows the synod's guidelines for salary which is based on years of experience. Health insurance premiums increase each year, and the youth trip was in 2024, so there will not be that expense in 2025. A motion to approve the budget was made by Janelle Hupp and 2nd by Tracy Pape. Motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Nancy thanked our outgoing board chairs (Lon Kaderavek, Ellen Jorgenson, Anne Klinkner, Donna Nelson and Nancy Kaufman) for their years of service. She then moved on to list nominees of Nancy Passehl to Executive Director, Marv Hupp as Assistant Director, John Brennan as Treasurer, John Ballweg for Properties, Melanie Wheeler for PR and Social Concerns. There is an opening for the Stewardship Board Chair. A motion to approve the nominees was made by Jayne Carlson and 2nd by Marilyn Herschleb. Motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Third, we approved the nominating committee to recruit members for additional PPC members that includes the Lead Pastor, Nancy Kaufman as the outgoing PPC Director, three congregational members (self-nominated) that include Mary Weeks, Dale Haroldson, and Donna Nelson. Three PPC members will be determined. A motion to approve the nominees was made by Marv Hupp and 2nd by Melanie Wheeler. Motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Our final topic was to accept nominations for attendees to the Synod Assembly in May 2025. We can send 3 adults (either 2 males and 1 female or 2 females and 1 male), 1 young adult (under 30 years old) and 1 high school youth. Our Lead Pastor and Pastor Sally are both voting members. Alice Chenowith self-nominated and nominated her husband, Joe. Jordan Small self-nominated for the under 30 category. Nancy Kaufman will find an additional person to attend. A motion to approve the nominees was made by Megan Tarnutzer and 2nd by Alexi Suchla. If any adult over 30 or a high

school youth is interested, please contact Linda Hines in the church office.

An update on the call committee progress by Nancy included Interim Pastor Jason will be with us through the end of January. The last two years have been busy and included building issues including heat and AC, new roof, carpeting, and intern/not an intern/intern again, hired a financial secretary, and Pastor Fred retired. We look forward to the next years that will include a new pastor as well as our future and changes that will happen in the transition. Jerry Kaufman made the motion to adjourn the meeting and was 2nd by Donna Nelson. Director Nancy Kaufman asked if there were any objections and after receiving none, she adjourned the meeting at 9:11 am.
